## From the Director *Mike Mabe*

With the recent COVID-19 pandemic, CCPL staff have quickly modified our service delivery approach to continue to offer essential library service to customers within the guidelines established by local, state and national leaders. This is not an unfamiliar task for CCPL staff. Following the Great Recession in 2010, CCPL staff reinvented library operations to enhance services with fewer staff and hours. Those changes are reflected in the types of services we deliver today.

Because of this previous reinventing experience, CCPL staff were able to immediately and effectively adapt library services based on quarantine restrictions. During this COVID-19 incident, we have offered the following modified service adaptations:

- Reference assistance via call center, email and live chat
- Material access via zero contact curbside pickup
- Increased digital collections
- And virtual programming including online story times

As we have reopened some locations to the public, we will take advantage of rethinking our operations with these modified services in mind. In the meantime, we are delighted to continue to provide quality library service to you the customer.

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## DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

**As** we adapt to the unprecedented circumstances presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, Chesterfield County Public Library continues to serve the community and provide valuable resources and learning opportunities. Zero contact curbside pickup, online story times and other virtual programs, online library card applications and a new live chat service are just some of the ways we have adapted to meet the needs of residents.

These efforts wouldn't be possible without the continued support we have received from you and our sponsors. 



This year's summer activity theme is Imagine Your Story. What a great opportunity to imagine what you want the story of your summer to be—and then make it happen! We hope that our summer activities will help you craft a summer experience of fun activities that can be done close to home.

Summer is here and we are as eager as you are to see its arrival. Kudos to all the parents, teachers and students who made it through a new online learning environment. Odds are all of you are a little burnt out from online learning. Honestly, we are too. This summer we're focusing on keeping it fun, and as screen-free as possible. We may help you sneak in a little learning too, but not so much that the kids will notice- like adding pureed vegetables to spaghetti sauce!

You've probably heard of summer slide, that time during the summer when students are more likely to lose academic gains because they're not being regularly engaged in the classroom. Studies show that just 20 minutes of reading a day can help combat summer slide. Some fun and easy ways to keep the kids engaged, in addition to reading, are taking a walk and talking about what you see in nature, making a recipe and talking about weights, measurements and cooking



time, listening to different types of music and discussing what you hear in the music. The kids enjoy the moment without realizing they're learning anything.

## Meeting Community Needs Through Innovation and Resilience

As the community began to respond to the COVID-19 threat, Chesterfield County Public Library (CCPL) staff realized that even if buildings were closed to the public due to the pandemic, customers still needed access to valuable materials and resources. Staff evaluated services and resources that could continue, while following health and government guidelines that would keep customers and staff safe and healthy.

Story time moved from being an in-person program to a live, online event. Librarians adapted the traditional story time format to engage children virtually. To help ease the transition, story time is still held during the normal time, 10:30 a.m. every day. Librarians read books, sing familiar songs and recommend easy craft projects children can make at home.

CCPL is continuing to add virtual programs for all ages by partnering with local performers and presenters to bring you even more events. Stay tuned for baking, art, music, financial

management, yoga and job searching programs. Find these programs by looking at our website, calendar and social media accounts.

CCPL suspended public access to buildings on March 16, but quickly implemented zero-contact curbside pickup on March 24. Curbside pickup allows customers to place items on hold and pick them up outside of the library, all with zero contact with staff. CCPL added curbside printing services soon after. Curbside service has been very popular, with some libraries seeing up to 100 customers in a day. Customers have made it clear that curbside pickup has been a lifesaver for them, keeping all members of the household entertained, engaged and learning.

To help those who did not have a library card, CCPL developed a new method for issuing cards. Customers can call the library call center at 804-751-CCPL (2275) to request a card over the phone or use the streamlined online form at [library.chesterfield.gov/library-card](http://library.chesterfield.gov/library-card).

To accommodate our most active readers, limits on number of items that can be checked out have been raised and due dates for all materials were extended to Aug. 31. In late May, CCPL began to accept returns on a limited schedule to ensure staff safety. After

items are returned, they are quarantined according to health department guidelines before being checked in. No fines are accrued during this time.

Use of online products like OverDrive/Libby that provides access to e-books and audiobooks and Hoopla, which provides access to movies, music and graphic novels, have seen new users increase by 140% to 200%. Research databases have also seen a significant increase in usage, as parents and students searched for online resources to support learning.



To give customers more ways to communicate with staff, CCPL established a call center and chat service. Phone calls to the library are automatically routed to the call center during operating hours.

CCPL's makerspace equipment is being used to support the community. CCPL employees are using the 3D printers and sewing machines to make pieces of face guards, plastic straps and fabric masks to donate to area organizations. Staff made masks for a women's shelter, a doctor's office and a local company. The 3D printed plastic straps, designed to attach to a mask's elastic ear loops and relieve pressure on the ears, were donated to Chippenham Hospital.


CCPL remains dedicated to providing quality programs and services and helping our neighbors navigate global changes.
